Website link for submissions will be available prior to September.

Family Friendly: No explicit gore, sex, or erotica.
Best judgement on strong language.

Fees:

\$10 Fee to offset cost of editors.
This fee will be waived if Author participates in critique groups
or Writer's Café for feedback on their entire work.

Kim Lemke - Genres - Fiction, Fantasy, some poetry.


Want to submit a writing piece to be included in a GLVWG newsletter? You can!
