More and More - The Write Stuff Conference

You already know about Michael Hauge coming as our keynote speaker (a feather in our cap), as well as our fine presenters and range of topics. Please DON'T overlook the other opportunities available during the conference.

Friday night is the popular Page Cut. You can sign-up ahead of time, and bring with you four copies of the first page of a longer work (fiction, creative nonfiction, or memoir) and a 100-word overview of the entire work. The moderator will read the submissions aloud, but the authors (you) will remain anonymous. A three person panel of agents, editors, or authors will provide off-the-cuff critiques.

Following Page Cut is the Social Gathering where you get to rub elbows with fellow authors, presenters, and agents. It is called networking. A good part of an author's success is achieved by showing up. If you can do this with a drink in your hand, all the better. Rumor has it Samuel Clemens might say a word or two.

Saturday there is a chance for participants to have a ten minute one-on-one with an agent or editor to pitch a project or ask questions. This too needs to be pre-arranged. Similarly, there are fifteen minute one-on-one consultation sessions where you can find expert assistance for promoting yourself and your book.

And don't forget the keynote speech by Michael Hauge, the Flash Writing Contest, and the Book Fair — where you can sell your book.

We'll see you at the conference.

The Power of Community

The African proverb, "It takes a village to raise a child," describes how many GLVWG members work to create the annual anthology. The personal commitment of these members has created three distinct anthologies for the organization. The culmination of three years of understanding what works and what doesn't work will usher in changes to the submission process, acceptations procedure, and editing process for 2018.

The growth of anthology wouldn't be possible without the hard work of Bernadette Sukley and this year's committee. While working full time, Bernadette guided the anthology to fruition. The members, board, and I want to thank Bernadette for her time and the fantastic anthology she created. Also, I want to thank all the GLVWG members who volunteered to work on the 2017 anthology.

The path to publishing in the 2018 anthology will start January 2017 by asking members to sign-up for the formats they intend to submit a work under. The sign-up sheets is not a commitment to participation, but rather a way to give the chair and board an estimate participators in order to plan for the financial cost,

committee members, and resources for the anthology.

Returning to a foundation idea introduced by Becky Bartlett, members will be encouraged to join in writing retreats and meet-ups groups. Whether we realize it or not, each of us possesses certain strengths to our writing. Mentoring each other brings confidence in writing.

In order to help refine the editing process, participants will be encouraged to join pre-submission critique session. (And yes, attending Writer's Café counts.) Learning to critique helps train you to view writing through new lenses. The board realizes that not all members are local or have the time to critique. You can opt-out of pre-submission critiquing by choosing to pay a \$10 one-time, cost-sharing content editing fee during the submission process.

Part of the initial submission process will be signing your contract. The contract enters you into a formal publishing agreement with GLVWG. The contract will be updated to address denial of submission issues.

Notification of receipt of submissions will be sent within three business days. Notification of content acceptance or denial will be sent by October 15.

The editing process will change to one round, affording each editor more time for client back-and-forth corrections.

The board hopes that these changes make the project more accessible to everyone, clarifies the process, encourages networking between individual members, and increase the educational value of the anthology. But none of these changes could've come about without those members who helped refined the process over the last three years.

As President, I want to thank all the GLVWG members who have worked on the anthology for their patience during the upcoming year of transition as we expand the process of this developing project.

Stop waiting. Know when your work is done.


In a karate school, there are instructors and fellow students to help the nervous student to earn a black belt.

Larry Schandt – Promoted an October Retreat.


Judith Mehl – The book, *Fountain of Death*, featuring a new herbal detective series, was released January 15.
