This month's Member Spotlight: Dianna Sinovic

. Dianna Sinovic is an author of speculative fiction and horror, as well as a certified book coach and editor. Her short stories have been published in several anthologies, most recently in *Hard-Boiled and Loaded with Sin* and *That Darkened Doorstep*, as well as several GLVWG anthologies. One of her short stories, in audio format, was featured on WPRB's *25-Hour Holiday Radio Show* in December. She's the chair for the 2025 GLVWG anthology, *Writing a Wrong*.

Dianna can't remember a time when she wasn't writing—or editing. She's worked as a print journalist, a part-time library director, and an editorial director for a marketing company. She now runs her own coaching and editing business, Diasin Books.

She loves writing short stories because of the challenge of the form, and her short fiction (aka flash) appears monthly on the blog site <u>A Slice of Orange</u>. But she also writes long form: She's currently shopping an urban fantasy novel, and during the latest NaNoWriMo worked on a spec fiction novel about an android.

Write Stuff Writers Conference News

On Thursday morning of the conference, Amy Deardon will be conducting a workshop entitled *Marketing Morning: Selling Your Work.*

Amy is an experienced self-publisher who loves to guide authors in how to happily self-publish and market their books while avoiding pitfalls. She also loves all things story (structure, technique, how to get words down).

She says, "I am an award-winning novelist, non-fiction book author, and company founder with a unique business model that allows authors to self-publish.

"EBook Listing Services: I established this company about eight years ago after hearing one too many sad stories from a subsidy-published author who had spent thousands of dollars for abasement full of books. My business model allows the author to self-publish with an ISBN that is registered to them, not me. I do work-for-hire to complete file preparation, book cover, and book listing for the author. I show him or her how to manage the account and do some marketing. As additional services I can register the book for the author in the Library of Congress (thus making them eligible for public library sales) and do SEO and keyword research to remarkably increase their sales without a platform."

When it comes to writing a novel, there are always two options available to you—you can come up with a story idea, sit down and start writing. Or you can take the time to plan and develop your story, in full, before you write a single word.

Crimes Against Grammar: Ciao Bella, 2023 Edition

Finalmente! We finally made it to Italy in October 2023, after cancellations due to the pandemic, heart issues, and a bum hip. This year my heart issues are under control, so my husband and I (and my shiny new hip) left on our long-awaited journey to the home of our ancestors.

I have casually been studying Italian off and on since 2006. I took noncredit classes at Northampton Community College and I use the Duolingo app.

Definitely not fluent, I'm good at pronunciation, and I understand a lot, especially if the person is not speaking at breakneck speed.

I'm not so great at Italian grammar. In the textbook we used in my first noncredit class, we learned "the indefinite article (a, an) has the masculine forms un, uno, and the feminine forms una, un', depending on the first letter of the noun the article precedes."

"The definite article (the) agrees with the noun it precedes in gender (masculine or feminine) and in number (singular or plural). The masculine forms are il, l', lo, gli, and the feminine forms are la, l', le, according to the initial letter, and the number of the word the definite article precedes."

I am still confused by that!

Sono ancora confuso da questo!

And conjugating Italian verbs? Molto complicato!

An important tense is passato prossimo—present perfect. This indicates an action completed in the recent past. However, many Italians also use this tense informally to indicate an action or event that occurred in the not-so-recent past. Mamma mia!

But in Italy I was able to understand a lot. And like in other European countries, many people speak English. If you attempt to speak the language, they will usually speak English to you.

The longer I was there the more I could put together sentences in Italian. I was able to ask for cortisone cream in a drugstore in Florence for the two pesky mosquito bites I got in Venice. And I successfully asked for directions to another store.

Since I got Italian Covid two days before we left, I was unable to visit a few places in Rome, so I'm already planning a return trip!

COURSE: PUBL 102 – Self-Publishing


This is a blended online class; we will meet via Zoom on Wednesdays from 2-3:15; the Monday coursework can be completed independently at home.
