### **The 2022 Big Moose Prize**

Each year Black Lawrence Press will award The Big Moose Prize for an unpublished novel. The prize is open to new, emerging, and established writers. The winner of this contest will receive book publication, a \$1,000 cash award, and ten copies of the book. Prizes will be awarded on publication.

The annual deadline is January 31.

Early bird special: Submit your novel by November 30 and save \$5 on the entry fee.

### **Prose**

Stuck with writer's block and looking for a way to jumpstart your escape? Prose offers weekly challenges meant to spark your creativity; many are just for fun, but look for the weekly numbered challenges posted by Prose (rather than community members or sponsors) for a chance to win money.

Prizes are typically between \$100 to \$200 and word counts are low — some as low as under 150, some as high as 500. So even if all you get from the prompt is a chance to flex your brain, it's not a bad deal.

Deadline: Weekly and monthly.

### **2021 CRAFT Creative Nonfiction Award**

Creative nonfiction only! (no academic work, fiction, or poetry), 6,000 word count maximum. They review literary nonfiction, but are open to a variety of genres and styles including memoir, lyric essays, personal essays, narrative nonfiction, and experimental prose—their only requirement is that you show excellence in your craft.

\$20 reading fee. Closes: December 30, 2021

### **Scrawl Place** (Literary Journal)

They are currently closed and plan to reopen later in November (you can sign up to their email list to be notified). They have a very specific and intriguing self-description "A litmag for readers who prefer Bashō to Lonely Planet". They publish creative nonfiction, poetry, and hybrids. They pay 35 dollars per piece. The editors only fixed criteria is that the work "be about or connected to or associated with a specific, physical place that someone could visit." They try to respond to all submissions within 4 weeks.

### **Samjoko**

A brand new journal just gathering work for their first issue, they publish fiction, poetry, nonfiction, articles, plays, screenplays, photography & art.

The Launchpad is the place where new, emerging women writers can experience having their work published on the Kaleidoscope WoJo™ website. This is a service Kaleidoscope offers to new writers to encourage the practice of submitting their work. Sometimes the hardest step for a new writer is getting beyond the place of self-criticism. Often that comes in the form of never actually sending their work out into the world. The Launchpad wants to be a place where you can grow your confidence by seeing your work published in a place where other writers gather.
